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
ORIGINAL TALE AND OUR ADAPTATION

Thumbelina was written by Hans Christian Andersen in 1835. Since then, there have been many different versions, but the original story is about a tiny girl that emerges from inside a flower when it blooms. She leaves her home and meets many different animals, all wanting something different from her. After many misadventures, she is rescued by a bird and meets a tiny flower-fairy prince who she falls in love with. The main themes of the original tale are kindness, greed, and peer-pressure. In Drama Ties' version, these same themes are explored, as well as the added themes of immigration and self-discovery. To learn more about Hans Christian Andersen and the different adaptions of the story, a simple internet search will guide you to lots of different publications and short videos!

Our synopsis:

Lina, a young girl, packs her bag and flees her disaster-stricken land. On her journey she meets a toad-like woman who wants to marry her to her son. She manages to escape and falls in love with a dangerous person who promises her everything. They introduce her to their friends and they all express their disgust at her appearance, persuading them to leave her. Heart-broken, Lina runs away again and finds true friendship in a mouse-like man, who suggests she marry his friend who will love her and keep her safe from harm. Lina likes this friend but they have nothing in common, Mr Mole likes the darkness and the quiet, whereas Lina likes sunshine, flowers and music. With a heavy heart, Lina says goodbye to her mousey friend and continues on her journey, looking for somewhere to call home. Eventually, and when she least expects it, in a field of flowers, far far away from where she came from, she meets someone completely different, and yet just like her. The Flower Prince. Lina has a new home. Thumbelina and her Prince enjoy teaching each other about their different lands. They live happily ever after.

WHAT IS BRITISH PANTOMIME?

Drama Ties' version of *Thumbelina* uses the Pantomime tradition and aesthetics. Pantomime in England is a much-loved tradition. It is a particular type of a musical comedy production and most often performed at Christmas time.

There are certain conventions that are used, which makes it a pantomime:

Audience participation

The audience are encouraged to call out, join in with and respond to the actors.

Slapstick

Clown-style humour with exaggerated physical actions.

Staging

The good characters enter from stage right (côté jardin) and the bad characters enter from stage left (côté cour). This dates back to medieval times when the right side of the stage symbolised heaven and the left side symbolised hell.

Famous songs

There is almost always at least one famous song that is revisited with funny lyrics. A popular choice is "12 days of Christmas".

SCENE ONE

A simple home

A joyful melody turns into the sound of riots. Thumbelina's mum calls for Thumbelina to pack a bag and escape imminent danger.

SCENE TWO

Green countryside

Thumbelina meets a woman called Toad. She is glamourous and utterly ridiculous, but she thinks she is fantastic. Toad is looking for a wife for her son, and so charms Thumbelina with her charisma and song. Thumbelina has fun but soon realises she is falling into a trap and runs away.

SCENE THREE

The city

Thumbelina arrives in a very trendy place, nothing like she has ever seen before. She meets Harley who is mysterious and alluring. Thumbelina falls under Harley's spell.

SCENE FOUR

The city

It becomes clear that Harley is mostly interested in simply using Thumbelina as a fashion accessory. Thumbelina's heart breaks and she decides to leave.

SCENE FIVE

Woodland

Lina goes to sleep under a tree. A mouse arrives and decides to watch over her to keep her safe while she sleeps. Mouse is extremely kind and caring, but often falls asleep himself! When they are both awake, they enjoy writing a song together and become great friends. Mouse invites Thumbelina to live with him for a while.

SCENE SIX

Woodland

Mouse sends Thumbelina to meet a friend of his, Mr Mole. Once at his door, she wonders whether she should knock and meet him or not. Something tells her it is not a good idea. She finally decides not to meet him and continues on her journey to find a home. Soon her bird is well enough to fly away and she has to say goodbye to this new companion also.

SCENE SEVEN

A field of flowers

Thumbelina meets someone entirely new, someone entirely different, and yet in some curious way, someone just like her. After enjoying learning all about each other... they live happily ever after!



MEET THE CHARACTERS

likes reading and singing, she loves nature and her family. She is young and vulnerable, and when she is forced to leave her family, she is unprepared for the challenges of a world away from home. Lina is based on the character of Thumbelina in the original story.

TOAD

Toad is a beautifully revolting woman! She is very self-confident and dreams of finding a good wife for her son. She is always searching for the best word to describe something. She is our pantomime Dame! Toad is based on the character of the toad in the original story.

Sound extract 2

"Well, hello there darlings! Am I not the most beautiful woman that you've ever seen? No, that's not what I mean, it's the wrong word, what do I mean... Glamorous? Luxurious? Elegant? Glittery?"

"The problem I have is my son! He is pathetic. No, that's not what I mean, it's the wrong word, what do I mean... Lazy! Passive! Pitiful!"

MOUSE

Mouse is silly and nervous, but also very sweet and extremely kind. He loves to invent games and cheer people up when they are feeling down. He and Lina write a friendship song together!

HARLEY

Harley has a magical energy and catches the attention of everyone. They are androgynous and an epicurean, a stark contrast to those that identify with a clear personality/class/gender. Harley is based on the character of the cockroach/beetle in the original story.

Activity 9: Get acting!

- 1. Imagine a character that you would like to play. It can be a character from Thumbelina or a new character.
- 2. One idea is to base the character on an animal, like in Thumbelina. Think about the characteristics of this animal-human. How do you walk/talk?
- 3. Altogether, walk around the room trying different ideas until you are happy with a character that you have created (teacher: you could shout 'FREEZE!' occasionally and have a look at their frozen characters).
- 4. In partners, each with your own character, prepare a very short scene where the two characters meet for the first time. Remember to think about how each character feels? (Afraid, reassured, in love, or something else....)
- 5. Present your mini scenes to the class!



Let's revise our pronouns!

Lina and Toad identify as girls and use the pronouns SHE/HER.

Mouse and the Flower Prince identify as boys and use the pronouns HE/HIM.

Harley does not identify as a specific gender and prefers the pronouns THEY/THEM.


Remember! They/them are used in front of plural nouns or noun groups, but we can also use the singular they/them when referring to a generic person whose gender is unknown or irrelevant to the context.




1/ THE POSTER


Creating the visual for a new play is very important. It should show the important themes but not give away too many surprises! Our poster was made with real wild flowers collected and pressed by the writer, interposed with a drawing commissioned from an artist in London. After trying many different examples, a slogan was chosen to go underneath the hand-written title.




















2/THE BIRD PUPPET

The bird is a very important part of the story. It represents freedom, hope, and responsibility. We decided that our bird would be represented by a puppet. For an actor, there is something magical about creating, bringing to life, and building a relationship with a puppet.

What is the difference between a puppet and a marionette? Both terms refer to an object that is manipulated by an operator, however the term marionette usually refers to a specific type of puppet – one that is manipulated by strings attached to a wooden bar.





The puppet in this show is made from recycled house-hold materials, with the exception of the professionally made head. The cast spent some time together experimenting with different ideas until we found the perfect puppet for our story!

The body of our bird is made from one large egg box, two bottle tops, some bits of wire, and some craft paper and craft tape. The head of our bird was made by an artist. She used papier mâché, beads for the eyes, some acrylic paint, a stick, and a spring.

Activity 12: You can try too! Collect some objects and see what different types of birds you can bring to life. Any recycled objects will work, with plenty of craft tape, and imagination!





THE THEMES

Thumbelina is on a journey, searching for a safe place to call home, searching for a friend and searching for herself. Along the way she is confronted with many different ideas about what these things really mean.

FOCUS ON IMMIGRATION

Immigration and seeking asylum has been an important topic for centuries. Whether it be those who fled religious persecution by King Louis XIV, African-American slaves seeking freedom, the evacuation of Vietnamese families following the end of the Vietnam war, the economic collapse of Venezuela, ongoing conflict in Syria, or more recently the military invasion of Ukraine. Let us not forget the worldwide issues of those fleeing stigma and discrimination due to emotional and sexual orientation, family estrangement, and countless other common struggles.

There are currently 65 million refugees trying to flee ongoing war, environmental disasters, economic destitution, or political persecution. That's more than the total number of refugees that fled nazi persecution during World War II.
